Colorado Universal Preschool Enrollment Now Open for 2025-26 School Year!

Enrollment is now open for Colorado's Universal Preschool (UPK) Program for the 2025-26 school year! Families can apply for up to 15 hours of free, high-quality preschool for children in the year before kindergarten, with additional hours available for qualifying families.

Since its launch in 2023, Universal Preschool has served more than 85,000 children, saving Colorado families an average of \$6,100 each year and providing a strong foundation for early childhood education. Families can explore participating providers and submit applications through <u>UPK.Colorado.Gov</u>.

Pre-Registration:

Now-February 3: Pre-registration application window for families requesting Continuity of Care placements. **February 3-10:** Window for families to accept or decline their match.

Family-to-Provider Matching Rounds:

February 3: Deadline to apply to be matched in the first family-to-provider matching round.

February 24: Families are notified of first round matches.

Families are asked to accept or decline by March 3.

March 3: Deadline to apply to be matched in the final family-toprovider matching round.

March 24: Families are asked to accept or decline their matched provider by March 31.

Direct Enrollment:

April 1- throughout school year

Coaching Framework for Effective Practice

Article Heading

The National Center on Early Childhood Development, Teaching, and Learning (NCECDTL) uses a house to represent six elements of quality teaching and learning for children ages birth to 5 in all Head Start program options. Quality teaching and learning uses children's and their families' lived experiences, home languages, perspectives, and cultural ways of knowing and being to make learning more meaningful and engaging. It creates equitable environments where all children feel a sense of belonging, and that promotes their social and emotional development and school readiness. The six elements of the Framework for Effective Practice, or House Framework are:

- 1. Interaction and Environments: Providing nurturing, responsive, and effective interactions, and engaging environments
- 2. Curriculum: Implementing research-based curriculum and teaching practices
- 3. Screening and Assessment: Using screening and ongoing assessment of children's skills
- 4. Individualized Support: Embedding highly individualized teaching and learning
- 5. Families: Engaging parents and families
- 6. Equity-focused Practices: Promoting high-quality equitable learning environments

When these elements are connected, they form a single structure that surrounds the family in the center. Family is at the heart of the house. Each element is implemented in partnership with parents and families as co-educators in their cultural and community context. Equity-focused practices and policies not only surround the house but are embedded throughout each element to ensure equitable access, belonging, high-quality nurturing and joyful experiences, and positive outcomes for all children and families.

We're Going on a Bug Hunt

Try it out!

We're going on a bug hunt, and we're going to find an amazing one! Invite children to go on an adventure to find bugs in your outdoor area, backyard, or local playground. Ask children where they think they will find insects — always follow their lead in the shared exploration. You can extend the insect hunt by asking predictive questions before venturing out, bringing materials to safely examine bugs before returning them to their habitat, or adding related materials to indoor play.

Did you know that insects and spiders are both a type of animal known as arthropods? All arthropods are invertebrates, meaning they do not have backbones. Shared arthropod features also include a hard, segmented outer covering called an exoskeleton and jointed legs. People often lump all "creepy crawlies" into one group, and they frequently call this group "bugs." In fact, bugs are just one group of insects, but for this activity we will use bug and insect interchangeably.

What ways do you like to explore your local bug population?

CDEC Policy & Legislation RECENTLY ADOPTED RULES

Colorado Child Care Assistance Program (CCCAP):

The Executive Director adopted emergency rules to implement <u>Colorado House Bill 24-1223</u>, and the new requirements for the

Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF), which became effective on January 1, 2025. (Colorado Secretary of State (SOS) Tracking No. <u>2024-00635</u>)

Child Care Centers, Family Child Care Homes (FCCH), Children's Resident Camps, School-Aged Child Care (SACC); and Neighborhood Youth Organizations (NYO): The Executive Director adopted amendments to the transportation rules on an emergency basis to implement <u>Colorado House Bill 24-1055</u>, which became effective on January 1, 2025, consistent with the effective date of the legislation (CO SOS Tracking No. <u>2024-00580</u>). The permanent version of these rules were also adopted, and will presumably become effective on February 14, 2025 (CO SOS Tracking No. <u>2024-00575</u>).

Children's Resident Camps:

The Executive Director permanently adopted amendments to the Children's Resident Camp rules to implement <u>Colorado Senate</u> <u>Bill 24-071</u>; and revisions resulting from a comprehensive rule review conducted pursuant to section 24-4-103.3, C.R.S. These rules will presumably become effective on February 14, 2025 (CO SOS Tracking No. <u>2024-00575</u>).

Special Activities:

The Executive Director permanently adopted amendments to the Special Activities rules in result of a comprehensive rule review conducted pursuant to section 24-4-103.3, C.R.S. These rules will presumably become effective on February 14, 2025 (CO SOS Tracking No. <u>2024-00575</u>).

Colorado Universal Preschool Program (UPK):

The Executive Director permanently adopted amendments to the Colorado Universal Preschool rules to establish the 2024 Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG) as the standard for determining poverty and low-income status of families applying for the program during the 2025-26 school year. Additional revisions introduced separate income eligibility charts for the current (2024-25) and upcoming (2025-26) school years, to clearly distinguish the applicable FPG used to assess eligibility for additional preschool hours. These rules will presumably become effective on February 14, 2025 (CO SOS Tracking No. <u>2024-00574</u>).


Free Monthly Book Membership for Children Birth to Age 5

Winter brings plenty of opportunities for fun, but it also presents unique challenges in keeping children safe and healthy. Our latest article provides essential tips to ensure your little ones stay warm and protected during the colder months.

Bundle up!

- Children are at greater risk for frostbite than adults. The best way to prevent frostbite is to make sure children dress warmly and don't spend too much time outside in extreme weather.
- Dress children in layers of warm clothing. If the top layer gets wet, they will still have a dry layer underneath.
- Tuck scarves inside coats and jackets to prevent them from becoming strangulation hazards.
- Car seats and winter coats don't mix. Bulky coats can compress in a crash and create a loose car seat harness. Instead, lay the jacket or a blanket over children once you've safely strapped them into their car seat.

What's in it for you?

• This course is intended for child care providers, teachers and professionals who work with or who would like to work

with CCCAP. This course is also helpful for professionals who support CCCAP and partner with families.

- This one-hour, self-paced course will answer your questions about being a CCCAP provider and your responsibilities, and help you get started.
- The CCCAP Provider Basics course counts towards Colorado Shines Level 2 and ongoing professional development hours for Licensing, Universal Preschool, and the Early Childhood Professional Credential (ECPC).

The statewide CCCAP program provides low-income child care assistance to qualified families and child care programs. Since this course is on the PDIS, early childhood professionals can take it to support their professional development at any time!
